

#### What is PORTAL?

The Patient Outcome Reporting Tool for emergency medical services (PORTAL) is an NIH-funded study and collaboration between Vanderbilt University Medical Center and ESO. PORTAL is an innovative, user-centered tool that delivers automated feedback on prehospital chest pain care (primarily electrocardiogram [ECG] and aspirin use). This study focuses on the launch of PORTAL and the feasibility of doing so.

# Why should I use PORTAL?

- 1. PORTAL users will receive access to reports about their Acute Coronary Syndrome (ACS) practice patterns and patient outcomes.
- 2. Users who <u>register at this REDCap link</u> are eligible to receive <u>up to 6 free Continuing</u> <u>Education (CE) credits</u> through CAPCE.
- 3. The <u>PORTAL website</u> contains free, brief educational talks about treating patients with suspected ACS including basic and advanced ECG use.

# How do I get free CAPCE credit?

Check with your site champion about specific CAPCE requirements for your site. Please be sure to register for CAPCE credit <u>before</u> using PORTAL to ensure you get credit for all your use.

### How often should I use PORTAL?

PORTAL is updated within a few hours of providing a clinical impression consistent with suspected ACS. Otherwise, PORTAL is not a daily-use tool, it is meant to be used periodically. We recommend checking PORTAL at least monthly.

### **Future Features of PORTAL**

There will be a number of updates coming to PORTAL over time including the incorporation of hospital-based patient outcomes via ESO Health Data Exchange tool and clickable links in the patient-level detail to take you directly to the incident run.
